Continue Japanese 1A with an emphasis on understanding, language skills in speaking, reading, listening and writing. The course also continue to introduce students to Japanese culture and traditions. - 3. Describe details about peoples' appearances, including their physical attributes and clothing items.
- 4. Talk about one's place of residence, work, and marital status and family members.
- 5. Report what other people say.
- 6. Express opinions and share ideas about common topics such as school subjects, music, food, sports, and places.
- 7. Compare two or more items.
- 8. Talk about their future plans, such as what the student wants to do or wants to be.
- 9. Talk about their past experiences.
- 10. Demonstrate the knowledge of Japanese culture and customs.
- 11. Read and write approximately 60 kanji characters.

Content: : Te-form verbs

Building up sentences for requests, permissions, and prohibitions. Demonstrating the ability to explain rules and regulations. Describing people's status, such as where they live, their occupations, and marriages.

Incorporating the explanation clauses "kara" into the statements

Content: Introduction to expressing likes and dislikes

Talking about likes and interests. Also talking about what they don't like.

Content: Health topics

Describing the names of body parts and their health conditions.

6 Hours:

Content: Comparison

Comparing two or more items in a sentence. Describing, asking, and answering about the comparison of things.

Content: Verb with "tai"

Talking about hopes and desires

6 Hours:

Content: Verb with "kotogaaru"

Describing experiences in the past

6 Hours:

Content: Verb with "kya ikenai"

Talking about what needs to be done.

6 hours:

Content: Reading and writing simple letters

Reading and writing short letters in Hiragana, Katakana, and Kanji.

2 Hours:

Content: Learn Japanese culture and traditions

Learning about and understanding Japanese culture in contemporary daily life. Also learning about traditional arts such as Kabuki, Bunraku, Noh, Sumo, Tea Ceremony, Calligraphy, and Origami.

2 Hours:

Content: Review of all the lessons

Reviewing all the lessons to confirm the Japanese language skills acquired.

2 Hours: Final Exam
