Reciprocity

Merriam- Webster Dictionary: REC-I-PROC-I-TY (res-uh-pros-i-tee): noun. a situation or relationship in which two people or groups agree to do something similar for each other.

Colleges that adopt a reciprocity policy honor the ways in which courses are used at other community colleges when certifying that course work at their college.

Course Substitution

A course substitution takes the place of a required course in a curriculum, provided it does not compromise the integrity of the course and/or program outcomes.

Certificates & Degrees

Substitution and Reciprocity

The passage of SB 1440 (Padilla, 2010) and the resulting faculty-designed Transfer Model Curriculum (TMC) system have altered the way colleges operate. Today, a higher level of coordination exists across the community colleges and with the universities. This new system affects traditional practices regarding course substitutions and reciprocity.

In the interest of best serving students and establishing an efficient transfer route, the Academic Senate for California Community Colleges (ASCCC) encourages colleges to apply courses successfully completed as part of a TMC-aligned degree at one college for requirements within their own degrees to the greatest extent deemed possible and reasonable (See ASCCC resolution 15.01 Spring 2011). While course substitution decisions remain a matter of local control, students often earn credit at multiple colleges during the course of their academic careers and, therefore, are best served when courses that are taken in good faith as part of a TMC-aligned degree at one college are accepted as part of a TMC-aligned degree at other colleges. Therefore, the ASCCC strongly urges community colleges to establish policies to allow

... the ASCCC urges colleges to allow all reasonable course substitutions that are consistent with the parameters of the TMCs.

Reciprocity Statement: Guides

- Pass along/accept courses as part of another college's ADT that are deemed reasonable;
- Maintain local control for course substitutions;
- •Where C-ID descriptors are not in place and/or where the substitution does not involve deeming two courses comparable, make informed course substitution decisions by the judgment of discipline faculty

Reciprocity Statement: Guides

- Ensure substitutions are consistent with the TMC parameters (some TMCs allow more flexibility in course substitutions than others);
- Apply external sources of credit: (e.g. AP, IB, CLEP) toward the GE and major. Use statewide documents and local policies for such determinations; and,
- Credit by Exam: Utilize existing local credit by exam policies.

S16 ASCCC Resolution

Resolved, That the Academic Senate for California Community Colleges develop by Spring 2017 resources that provide guidance to local senates on effective practices for the appropriate use of course substitutions by students who have transferred between colleges and who intend to earn an Associate Degree for Transfer while ensuring that the integrity of the degree is not compromised. May 2018

Title 5 §55063

§ 55063. Minimum Requirements for the Associate Degree. The governing board of a community college district shall confer the associate degree upon a student who has demonstrated competence in reading, in written expression, and in mathematics, and who has satisfactorily completed at least 60 semester units or 90 quarter units of degree-applicable credit course work (as defined in section 55002(a)) which falls into the categories described in section 55062. A college may also accept toward satisfaction of this requirement courses that were not completed at a California community college that would reasonably be expected to meet or exceed the standards of section 55002(a). Effective for all students admitted to a community college for the Fall 2009 term or any term thereafter, competence in written expression shall be demonstrated by obtaining a satisfactory grade in an English course at the level of the course typically known as Freshman Composition (either Freshman Composition or another English course at the same level and with the same rigor, approved locally) or by completing an assessment conducted

Examples from Los Angeles Community Colleges & Santa Monica College

Los Angeles Community Colleges Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT) Reciprocity Guidelines

Endorsed unanimously by the District Academic Senate (DAS) and the District Curriculum Committee on July 15th, 2016

It is the intent of the colleges to support student progress toward their degree completion by carefully reviewing incoming courses in an effort to determine whether courses completed at other United States regionally accredited institutions may be substituted for LACCD courses without compromising the integrity of the degree. It is important to keep in mind that the Associate Degrees for Transfer (ADTs) are statewide degrees, so when evaluating coursework from other institutions for applicability to the degrees, the statewide Transfer Model Curriculum (TMC) template should be referenced whenever necessary to ensure we are following the intent of the degree for the benefit of our students.

Students are required to:

- Complete 60 semester or 90 quarter CSU transferable units
- Complete all courses in the major with a "C" or better; grades of Pass "P" are
 permissible in the major although students should be counseled that some CSUs
 may require them to repeat the major courses after transfer for a letter grade.
 The "P" must defined by the institution as being equivalent to a "C" or higher.
- Complete either the CSUGE or IGETC general education pattern. Note that effective Fall 2017 the Golden Four must be completed with a "C-" or higher.
 - CSU IGETC is not mandated, so students can be IGETC certified without completion of Area 1C, Oral Communication, but students should be advised that Oral Communication is a CSU admission requirement.
 - In some cases, the statewide Transfer Model Curriculum (TMC) template may limit the general education plan option. For example, the Biology and Chemistry ADTs require completion of CSUGE for STEM or IGETC for STEM. Since we don't offer these ADTs counselors will most likely not see students seeking these degrees.
- Achieve a cumulative transferable GPA of 2.0 in all baccalaureate-level courses.
- Complete a minimum of 12 units in residence at the college conferring the degree.

<u>Students cannot be required to complete any additional local requirements—Global Citizenship at SMC.</u>
