Program Objective 1: Acquire MIDI keyboard controllers for MUS 21 course.

Status: A half-dozen MIDI controllers have been purchased. Need a half-dozen more.

Program Objective 2: Complete wiring of Music Hall's recording studio for Audio Recording Program.



Status: We have been able to get some bids for the wiring. Estimating cost to run 24 channel snake including labor and materials is \$2,200 The wiring should be completed by Spring of 2019.

Strategy #2, Goal #2 Goal #6

Program Objective 3: Acquire vocal isolation booth and implement sound treatment to Music Hall for the Audio Recording Program

Status: We have been able to put an on/off switch in the vocal booth. As of August 2017, the booth has been ordered and delivered. Hoping to have the booth installed by Spring of 2019.

Strategy #2, Goal#3

Program Objective 4: Acquire live sound equipment for Music 12 and 14 class.

Status: Ongoing. Depending of the needs for the class the budget for the request is in constant flux. For example, electronics become outdated, speakers blow up, cords get shorts.

Strategy #3, Goal #1

Program Objective 5; The music department would like to explore the possibilities of expanding the music program.

Status: World Music and The history of Rock and Jazz have been approved by the curriculum committee and have been implemented with great success. The class has high enrollment and 90% success rate.

Strategy #2, Goal #6

Program Objective 6: Acquire two Grand Pianos for MU101 and MU102.

Status: Ongoing. Both rooms are in desperate need of new Grand pianos, for teaching and performing. The Grand Piano in the piano lab has been purchased approximately 40 years ago. The piano is in very bad shape. Unfortunately, the manufacturer does not make these pianos anymore, so it is very difficult to repair broken parts.

The grand piano in MU101 was purchased 15 years ago. Due to improper storage the sound board of this piano has major issues and is not suitable for performances, demonstrations or concerts. After renovation of MU101, we hope to use the Music Hall for small concerts and performances.

Strategy #2, Goal #1



Program Objective 7: The renovated Music Hall needs lighting, drapes, cushioned seats and paint for concerts.

Status: Ongoing. The music hall has the appearance of an industrial building. It needs to look like a music hall. Drapes, lighting and cushioned seats provide an atmosphere suitable for an intimate concert hall. Estimates have been obtained. We had accepted a bid from a company out of Santa Cruz, Unfortunately they have not followed through. We have to get new bids from different companies. Hoping to finish the project by Spring of 2019.

B. What results have you seen because of these modifications? (Include data if available.)

Hiring second full time instructor allowed the program to grow and gain stability.

Adding second full time instructor gave stability to our music theory and survey courses. The enrollment in music theory and survey courses has gone up.

New keyboards/headphones for the piano lab allow students to successfully complete their weekly practicing requirements in the lab. It was difficult for students to complete their practicing assignments with old keyboards due to non-functioning keys on majority of the keyboards. Students would lose interest after seeing the old, non functioning keyboards/headphones. After purchasing 18 new keyboards and headphones I noticed a dramatic change in students interest and motivation.

With the purchase of the vocal booth (this semester) the program will be able to offer students recording opportunity for their music classes. Hoping to have the booth installed by Spring of 2019.

C. What methods does the program use to maintain the integrity of academic standards and achieve consistency within the discipline, particularly in regard to multiple section introductory classes?

Music Program has AA-T degree. Our courses are aligned with CID classification.

The two full time instructors determined student expectations and agreed on methods for assessing them including continuous check-ins with music students and consistent performance evaluations rated in the same manner. These methods and expectations are then communicated to part-time music instructors during their onboarding with a formal sit-down meeting with both full time instructors. This process then ensures that all instructors are communicating the same information.

D. What are the program's methods for evaluating and modifying the contents of course offerings? Please provide examples of the result of this process.

Our program offers alternative scheduling. In addition to morning classes we have successfully added afternoon classes and online courses. We have made some of our classes fit into the block scheduling. With growing interest and popularity of hybrid and online courses, from Spring of 2018 all piano classes were offered as hybrid courses and



Music Appreciation was offered as an online course. Currently y more music courses are being worked on to make the change to hybrid.

Music faculty is continuously working on incorporating the newest teaching trends, elements, repertoire in their classrooms by attending concerts, music workshops, self practicing and numerous performances. Currently, Gavilan has many innovative approaches to teaching including the use of online courses and increased use of technology in lectures and coursework. We are constantly incorporating recent developments in the field of Music Performance/Production, including new principles and techniques for learning to play and perform, recent technological innovations in Music Production, as well as new theories and schools of thought as they apply to course offerings at Gavilan.

1. Enrollment and FTES

The decrease in enrollment during 2016-17 can be attributed to a few reasons: the overlapping of music classes causing students to have limited options, the rising job economy, and shifts in staffing. For 2017-18 and beyond we have upped our recruitment efforts by reaching out to the local community and high schools on a regular basis. We have also added a major jazz festival to the performance schedule further encouraging new members of the community to experience the campus and staff.

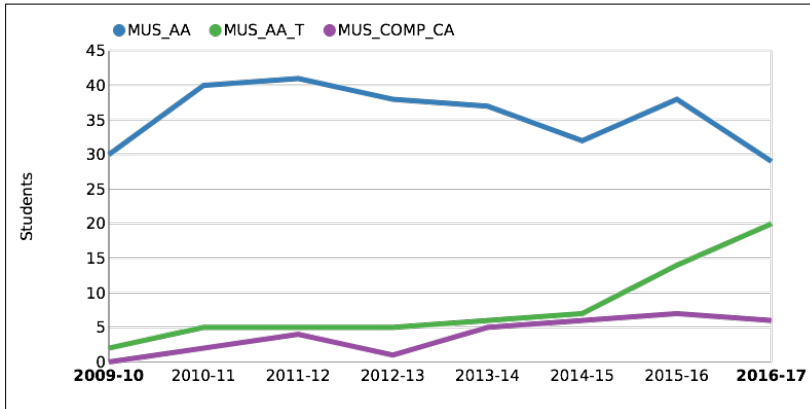


iii. Number of majors by year (4 years).

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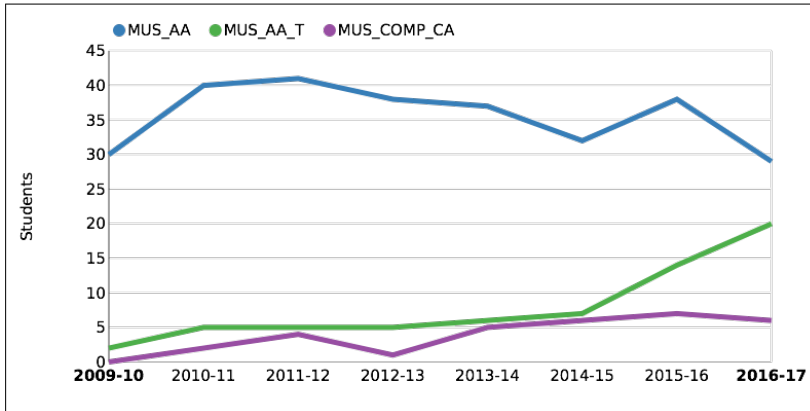


iv. Number of degrees and certificates by top code and year (4 years).

D. Provide an overview of how budget allocations have changed over the past three to five years.

Reduction in music budget (from \$5000 to \$900) allocation of instructional supplies has caused us not to be able to tune/repair/maintain our musical instruments, equipment and software.

This reduction h to the budget has caused severe issues for our students who rely on our instructional equipment. Without having properly maintained equipment students feel frustrated and unable to complete projects and homework assignments. In many of our classes equipment either needs repair or maintenance. In the Music Ensemble class we have broken amplifiers, broken keyboard and non functioning drum set. The PA system has broken pods and a number of the channels on the snake no longer receive signal. In the recording studio our main apple computer is non functioning. We have two grand pianos that are beyond repair and need replacement. With all these ongoing issues our students are using outdated equipment and sources.

The pursuit of excellence in music education is the mission of the Department of Music. To accomplish this mission, we have set three goals for ourselves. The first goal is to provide the students with a strong foundation in music. This includes music history, introduction to guitar, piano, voice, music performance, audio recording, and electronic music. Second, the Department commits itself to the continuing development of musical potential and ability in students by providing students the opportunity to perform for our communities and receiving high quality instruction in continued improvement of our facilities. Third, in order to cultivate a musically literate community, the Department promotes the study, creation, and performance of diverse forms of music on and off campus. Finally, the department achieves its mission through the



integration of performance, composition, analytical processes, educational methods, technological elements and the historical study of music within the curriculum.

In 2011, the Gavilan College Music Program restructured the AA degree in music to be more competitive with all other colleges and implemented a certificate of achievement in Music. Music Program offers AA-T degree and all of our classes are CID allied.

The music program at Gavilan College offers a range of fully transferable courses that are comparable to other music programs at other community colleges. We offer courses in theory, music history, history of jazz and rock, world music, song writing, voice, guitar, piano, audio recording, electronic music and music ensemble. In addition, in the Spring of 2019 Music program will offer a Music Fundamentals class

Since last IEC review, Gavilan college has hired second FT faculty in music. In addition, Gavilan college has hired several adjunct instructors to teach some of the new courses that have recently been introduced to the program.

A couple of unique characteristics to the program include a series of concerts with the goal of reaching out to the community. Part of the community outreach has been Marian Flice Annual Piano Competition that has been reaching out to the youth of the tri-county that Gavilan serves and is bringing the potential students to Gavilan to see our facilities and meet the instructors. Also part of our concert series includes our yearly Bach to Blues concert that showcases Gavilan Music faculty and prominent musicians in our community. Members of the community are so thrilled with our Bach to Blues concerts that a music fund has been established to maintain and expand the music possibilities in our program such as new equipment, scholarships, and music festivals. In September of 2017 Music program introduced new annual concert: Jazz Festival.

Some recent accomplishments of the program would include: the music ensemble reaching out to the community. This would include performing at various community events throughout the Gavilan College service learning areas. Examples include performances at Bach to Blues, Job Fair, Assisted Living Facilities and performances and local high schools. In addition the music department offers a yearly youth piano competition for potential future students. In the Festival portion of the competition our students perform. All music students are highly encouraged to attend the event. Potential students are able to see the Music facilities and meet the faculty. Our annual Bach to Blues and Jazz Festival, showcases the talents of our instructors and former students and prominent musicians of our community. This resurgence has allowed our students to have a great service learning experience which also provides important outreach. Finally the development of new classes such as song writing, digital recording, history of rock and jazz and world music have rejuvenated the program. The enrollment is up in those survey courses. Student evaluations reflect very positive attitude among the students.

Some of developments/changes since last IEC report review include: the purchase of new pianos for the piano lab, the purchase of the vocal booth, hiring of second FT faculty member.

With the purchase of the new piano lab system students are able to successfully complete their assignments free from broken keys and parts. The addition of the second FT instructor successfully revived Music Theory and the survey courses.
